# FINDING A BABYSITTER

Finding a babysitter involves advertising, networking, making calls and posting flyers.

### Writing and Placing an Ad and Posting Flyers

One of your best options is to place an ad in your local newspaper. Many have found specialty newspapers, catering to a particular ethnic or age group to be an excellent resource. Many colleges and schools maintain "job boards" for their students. **Resources On Call** will provide information on your area papers, colleges and sample flyers.

Before you write your ad, consider these tips:

- ◆ Check the "Situations Wanted" section to see if anyone meeting your needs is advertising for a position
- ◆ Look at current ads to give you an idea of salaries and to help you phrase your ad
- ♦ Make a list of your requirements
- ◆ Ask the paper how they arrange the ads and adjust yours accordingly. Ads at the top of a section often get the greatest response.

### Sample Ad

# INTERVIEW GUIDE

When you interview caregivers, you will want to ask questions that give you information about their motivation, experience, reliability, and personality. Use the questions below as a guide, and add your own. Highlight the areas that you feel are important to the person you are interviewing.

- What do you enjoy most about children?
- ♥ What do you think children like best about you?
- What activities do you like doing with children? (relate to your own children's ages)
- ♦ What was your last babysitting experience? What other experiences have you had caring for children?
- ♥ What did you like most about each experience? What did you find difficult or like least?
- ◆ Do you have any health-related conditions that could present a problem in this job?
- ★ Have you ever had to handle an emergency of any kind? What happened and how did you handle it?

### TIPS FOR HIRING TEENS

Many adolescents make wonderful babysitters. But because of their age and developmental level, they need to have "house rules" clearly spelled out. Here are some suggestions:

- ✓ Don't expect a teenager to handle a phone conversation with your child's doctor or poison control center. Make sure s/he has access to an adult - such as a neighbor - who can help out in an emergency
- ✓ Clearly explain special routines, such as rocking the baby to sleep or stopping sibling disputes
- ✓ Be specific about your house rules:
  Can the sitter have visitors?

Which are the foods she can eat?

Can she use the VCR? the microwave?

Is it all right if she falls asleep on the couch if you are going to be out late?

# SITTER JITTERS

Although it's difficult leave your new baby with a babysitter, experts say that going out with your spouse is not just recommended - it's essential. Still, it's not unusual for a new mother to have ambivalent feelings about going out. With the right preparations, leaving your child with a babysitter will be a less stressful experience.

#### Choose a sitter you really trust

If you're nervous about leaving your child with a teenager or college student, keep interviewing until you find one who has experience with babies and can provide good references from other parents.

#### Have a trial run

Ask the sitter to come for one or two paid practice sessions, during which you show her the ropes. Try leaving for just a short while toward the end of the session.

#### Start short and sweet

Begin with a two or three hour date. If you're nursing, try to time a big feeding just before you go and leave a bottle of pumped milk or formula behind.

### Choose a place where you can be easily reached by phone

Instead of a movie, go to a nearby restaurant or friend's house.

#### Feel free to call

Of course you'll want to check in. Just don't call so often that you wake a peacefully sleeping baby!
